COURSE PREREQUISITE: Appropriate score on the ESL placement exam or completion of ESL 123

COURSE OBJECTIVES: The goal of this course is to provide intermediate, college-bound ESL students with essential practice with reading strategies necessary in an academic environment. Therefore, upon completing this course, students should:

- use pre-reading strategies to develop expectations about the content of the reading passage
- learn to skim texts for the main idea and scan for specific information
- use graphic organizers to organize and retain new information
- use context clues such as roots, suffixes, prefixes, punctuation, and grammar to determine the meaning of unfamiliar words and phrases
- recognize and understand the sequential organization of ideas in written texts (thesis statement, supporting paragraphs, and concluding paragraph)
- expand vocabulary knowledge through the development of structure / transition words, content words, and synonyms / antonyms
- learn to paraphrase and synthesize information in the text
- develop inferential skills
- respond (oral & written) to the content of a text using critical analysis techniques

EXAMS: A midterm & final exam will be given to assess your ability to utilize various types of reading strategies during the reading process and the extent to which you comprehend written texts in terms of recognition, recall, synthesis, inferencing, and critical analysis skills. Make-up exams WILL NOT be given except under extraordinary circumstances to be determined by the instructor. Thus, failure to take an exam on the day it was originally administered will result in a ZERO for that exam.

QUIZZES: A short quiz will be given after each chapter (except for Chapters 5 & 10) to assess your comprehension of the vocabulary and concepts presented in the chapter. Make-up quizzes WILL NOT be given except under extraordinary circumstances to be determined by the instructor. Thus, failure to take an quiz on the day it was originally administered will result in a ZERO for that quiz.

HOMEWORK: Homework will be assigned from the *Interactions* text. The assignments will provide you with consistent practice with reading strategy development and reading comprehension skills. You will receive full credit for all FULLY completed work turned in on the due date. However, late homework will NOT be accepted for credit except under extraordinary circumstances to be determined by the instructor. Thus, failure to turn in homework on the due date will result in a ZERO for that assignment.

PENGUIN BOOK REPORTS (PBR): A book report will be assigned at the beginning of the semester & again after midterm. For each report, you will choose any *Penguin* LEVEL 3-4 book title (available from me or from the library) that interests you. After you have read the book, you will prepare a book report to be completed by the due date. Any book report turned in late will be reduced by 10% per class day after the original due date.
