

ADJECTIVE CLAUSES

SENTENCE COMBINING. Combine each of the following pairs of sentences, using the **SECOND** sentence as the adjective clause. Sentence patterns may vary in cases where more than one relative pronoun is possible.

1) My father called the police. His wallet was stolen

2) The taxi driver was friendly. He took me to the airport.

3) The Gomez family is very nice. We visited them yesterday.

4) Las Vegas is the gambling capital of the world. It is located in Nevada.

5) The man is standing over there. I mentioned him to you.

6) Monet's *Water Lilies* painting is beautiful. She admires it.

7) I am using a sentence. It contains an adjective clause.

8) I liked the composition. You wrote it.

9) I live in a dormitory. Its residents come from many countries.

10) The man is standing over there. I was telling you about him.

SENTENCE COMBINING. Combine each of the following pairs of sentences, using the **SECOND** sentence as the adjective clause. Be sure to give all possible patterns when more than one relative pronoun is possible.

- 1) My father called the police. His wallet was stolen
My father, *whose* wallet was stolen, called the police (NON RESTRICTIVE)
- 2) The taxi driver was friendly. He took me to the airport.
The taxi driver *that* took me to the airport was friendly. (RESTRICTIVE)
- 3) The Gomez family is very nice. We visited them yesterday.
The Gomez family, *whom* we visited yesterday, is very nice. (NON RESTRICTIVE)
- 4) Las Vegas is the gambling capital of the world. It is located in Nevada.
Las Vegas, *which* is located in Nevada, is the gambling capital of the world.
(NON RESTRICTIVE)
- 5) The man is standing over there. I mentioned him to you.
A. The man *that* I mentioned to you is standing over there. (RESTRICTIVE)
B. The man I mentioned to you is standing over there. (RESTRICTIVE)
- 6) Monet's *Water Lilies* painting is beautiful. She admires it.
Monet's *Water Lilies* painting, *which* she admires, is beautiful. (NON RESTRICTIVE)
- 7) I am using a sentence. It contains an adjective clause.
I am using a sentence *that* contains an adjective clause. (RESTRICTIVE)
- 8) I liked the composition. You wrote it.
A. I liked the composition *that* you wrote. (RESTRICTIVE)
B. I liked the composition you wrote. (RESTRICTIVE)
- 9) I live in a dormitory. Its residents come from many countries.
I live in a dormitory *whose* residents come from many countries. (RESTRICTIVE)
